

## Rehabilitative Programming for Inmates

CDCR's Division of Rehabilitative Programs' top priority is to provide rehabilitative programming and skills to inmates in an effort to reduce the likelihood of reoffending by the time they return to their homes, and their communities.

## What is a Reentry Hub?

The Reentry Hubs are an integral part of CDCR's plan for restructuring our rehabilitative efforts. The goal is to identify individual inmate criminogenic needs and provide program opportunities to address those needs prior to the inmates release from prison. Due to the size of the Department's inmate population, as well as program space and funding, CDCR will focus on inmates who are within four years of release. These programs, policies, and procedures are currently being developed by a combined group of staff from the Division of Rehabilitative Programs and the Division of Adult Institutions, as well as staff from the designated Reentry Hub institutions. These programs and policies will be integrated cohesively as part of our in-prison programming and are anticipated to begin in the summer of 2013.

The five major components of a Reentry Hub are:

### Enhanced Academic Education Programs

- Inmates are now required to obtain a high school diploma or GED
- All CDCR institutions will continue to have Academic Education, but Reentry Hubs will have additional classes available

### Career Technical Education Programs

- These programs will focus on providing inmates with marketable trade skills that will help them make a living upon release
- All CDCR institutions will have CTE, but Reentry Hubs will offer additional programs

### Cognitive Behavioral Therapy Programs

- Substance Abuse Treatment – A 150-day program for inmates with 6 to 12 months left to serve; SAT programs will be administered by contract providers with oversight from CDCR

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- Criminal Thinking – A program that explores the relationship between thoughts, emotions, and behaviors; emphasizes the role of altering thinking patterns in bringing about change in an offender's life
- Anger Management – This program helps offenders recognize situations that trigger anger, and learn healthy constructive ways to express anger and frustration
- Family Relationships – A program that addresses issues regarding the offender's relationship with his/her family, including how relationships work in a family situation, and how to better understand and communicate with one another

#### Transitional Programs

- Pre-employment transition programs include teaching job readiness skills, transition planning, job searching, job application completion, drafting winning resumes, preparing for an interview, accessing a career center, and financial literacy
- Partnerships between the counties and CDCR are important to ensure that offenders, when they come home, continue to have access to resources they need in order to make their transition successful

#### California Identification Card

- This program assists eligible inmates in obtaining state-issued ID cards upon release to help with their reintegration

- California State Prison LA County – Facility C
- California Substance Abuse Treatment Facility – Facility F
- Valley State Prison – Facility D
- Central California Women's Facility - all
- California Institution for Women - all
- Folsom Women's Facility - all



## The Road to Reentry

### How do Inmates get to the Reentry Hubs?

Inmates that meet the eligibility criteria will be moved to Reentry Hubs during the last four years of their term. The criteria include:

1. Inmates that have four years but no less than one year remaining to serve; however, transfer to a Reentry Hub facility can begin at five years remaining to serve
2. Inmates that have a California Static Risk Assessment (CSRA) score of moderate or high
3. Inmates that have a Correctional Offender Management Profiling for Alternative Sanctions (COMPAS) assessment need of medium or high
4. Inmates that do not have an active felony hold, warrant, or detainer that may result in additional incarceration following their release date
5. Inmates that do not have an active Immigration and Customs Enforcement hold, which would result in deportation
